What are Scams? Scams are untrue tricks used to steal money or personal information and are becoming more common with modern day technology.

Common Scams to Watch For



Phone Calls

A caller may pressure you to give personal details, passwords, or money right away by pretending to be the IRS, a bank, or even a family member.



Gift Card Requests

No real company or government office will ever ask to be paid with gift cards. If someone does, it is always a scam.



Text Messages & Emails

These often contain urgent warnings ("Your account is locked!") or links to fake websites. Opening links can allow scammers to steal information.



Prize Offers

Be cautious if someone says you've won money, a free trip, or a prize but must first send payment or share bank details.



Ways to Stay Safe

- Hang up the phone if a caller makes you feel pressured or worried.
- Don't share personal information like Social Security numbers, bank accounts, or passwords over the phone, text, or email.
- If unsure, call a trusted family member or the business directly using the number you know—not the one in the message.
- Slow down and double-check.
 Scammers rely on making people feel rushed.
- Keep in mind: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
